Exclusive partnership with Mucem The Mediterranean is an area of constant interaction ,

The Mediterranean Sea has always been a crossroads through which humans have forged partnerships, brought about new ways of trading, meeting and confronting each other. It is nothing less than an interlacing of Connectivities, as pointed out by Adrien Joly, Director of External Relations and Resource Development at Mucem (Museum of European and Mediterranean Civilisations).

Can we talk of a Mediterranean identity?

The Mediterranean is at the very heart of Mucem's scientific and cultural project. We are a museum of civilisations, and the Mediterranean is our territory. With our permanent Connectivities gallery, we consider the Mediterranean to be an area of constant interaction. We have based this on the thesis of Fernand Braudel, the great thinker of the Mediterranean, for whom, in the 16th century at a time when terrestrial communications were complicated (marshes, mountains, rudimentary and risky road networks, etc...), ships were a lot faster. All the great Mediterranean civilisations developed on the coasts, through port cities.

What role has the Mediterranean Sea played in the interaction between peoples?

These cities were nodes of communication between land and sea, both in the Mediterranean and also with other continents. All the richness of the Mediterranean is directly linked to this.

Each event that occurred in one place had almost direct repercussions on the other shores, even if at the time, there were two opposing worlds: those of the Christians and of the Ottomans. The Mediterranean people were not necessarily great navigators, but were above all excellent traders. It is a civilisation of interaction and, via trade, we have witnessed cultural exchanges, due also to the curiosity of the Mediterranean people.

What is the advantage in visiting the Mediterranean on a cruise?

The incredible thing about taking a cruise is that you can really understand the distance between each site. This allows a reading of History based on feelings. It is a rather unique experience because today, apart for on a cruise, our way of moving around is not the same. We take a plane from point to point, so we have a different notion of time. With boats, we can better understand the connections between the cities.

Michel Cymes, doctor, surgeon and host of health shows, and the emblematic Patrick Poivre d'Arvor, TV presenter of the 8pm news in France for over 30 years, will be present on certain sailings this summer. With us, they shared their desire to go to sea alongside you.

Why are you participating in this summer season?

Michel Cymes: The sea is the only place in the world where I can really "unwind". To be at sea, to look at the horizon, to think of nothing... a priceless luxury. Christophe Barbier

Journalist and editorial writer, editorial director of *L'Express* from 2006 to 2016. "Despite Jean Bart and Surcouf, the French have always looked more towards the land, more eager to invade the continent than to explore the oceans! However, it is by exploring the world that you learn about yourself: this is why you have to look at France from the sea!"



Nicolas Bouzou

French economist and essayist, graduate of the Paris-Dauphine University and a Master of Finance from IEP Paris. "In recent years I have had the chance to travel a lot in America and Asia. Quickly hired to sing the Countess (*the Marriage of Figaro*), Juliet (*Romeo and Juliet*) or Donna Anna (*Don Giovanni*), she also performed Verdi's Requiem on numerous occasions.



Jean-Louis Debré

Investigating judge then Minister of the Interior, President of the National Assembly then of the Constitutional Council, he now devotes himself to writing. *"To observe France from the sea is to marvel at the beauty of its maritime facades and their diversity. It is another way of understanding its history, of understanding its culture and its particularities."*



François de Closets

A graduate of law and of the Institute of Political Studies, he pursued a double career as a journalist and writer. "I have never been on a cruise along our coasts and admired the French littoral, one of the most diverse and most beautiful in the world. Yes, we are attracted by the exotic and we often pass by the wonders that are close at hand."



Julia de Funès

Doctor of Philosophy and graduate of Higher Specialised Studies in HR, Julia de Funès founded her own organisation, Prophil Conseil, which works with large companies. She created and presented the daily programme "Le bonheur selon Julia" (Happiness according to Julia) broadcast on France 5 in 2012, and hosted a philosophy column on BFM Business for two years.



André Dussollier

Actor, three times recognised at the César Awards, including that of best actor for his role in *On connaît la chanson*, in 1997. He has played with great filmmakers such as Alain Resnais, Jean Becker, Claude Sautet, Claude Lelouch and François Truffaut. He also treads the boards and received the Molière for best actor in 2015 for his role in *Novecento*.

Pascal Gueret

Cardiologist, his research work focuses on noninvasive cardiac imaging and its clinical applications (coronary artery disease, hypertension, etc...). 'Those who rush across the sea change the weather, not their hearts' (Horace)."



Luc Ferry

Philosopher, politician and man of letters, associate of Philosophy and Doctor of State in Political Sciences. It was only right that we should start from "the city of wonders" for this itinerary to (re)discover iconic Atlantic coasts, combining gastronomic and natural heritage.

The Bordeaux vintages are matched by the oyster villages of the Arcachon basin. Surrounded by the equally famous dunes of Pilat and Cap Ferret, "the Bassin", as the locals call it, cultivates a delicate art of living in an exceptional natural environment.

This gentle ambiance is to be found in Saint-Jean-de-Luz or on the island of Aix. Last French island frequented by Napoleon before his exile in Saint Helena, along with Hoëdic Island it gives a particular note to this cruise. Both are part of the Ponant Islands, which inspired the name of our company 30 years ago.

Sailing close to the Cordouan lighthouse in the Gironde estuary or encountering the salt marshes and the many birds of the Ile de Ré, which find refuge in the Lilleau des Neiges national nature reserve, are witnesses to the intoxicating force of nature. The tides transform these landscapes of raw beauty at regular intervals, fish-filled waters abound, and a feeling of peace dominates.

FOCUS ON... THE PONANT ISLANDS

- Ponant literally means "where the sun settles".
- The Ponant Islands archipelago includes 15 islands lapped by the English Channel or by the Atlantic Ocean.
- Among them, nature lovers are charmed by the island of Hoëdic. They appreciate its grey dunes, its white sandy or pebble beaches and its rocky coasts.
- Of the Ponant islands, the island of Aix is the most southerly. It is known for being home to a group of fortifications whose line was designed by Vauban, and for having been the last of French land to be trodden by Napoleon 1st.
- But the island of Aix is especially famous for its proximity to Fort Boyard. Built in the 19th century, it is a superb illustration of the ingenuity of generations of builders.





INTERVIEW

"AT THE CORDOUAN LIGHTHOUSE, WE LIVE WITH THE OCEAN"

Pierre Cordier is one of the six keepers of the Cordouan lighthouse, the oldest French sea lighthouse still in activity, located at the mouth of the Gironde estuary. 67.5 metres high, it has guided ships since 1611. See you at the top!

A unique lighthouse

"The Cordouan lighthouse is one of the oldest lighthouses in the world. It is unique for its very particular chapel and architecture, between Renaissance and Baroque. It is a historic beacon: it served as religious propaganda in favour of Catholicism in the face of Protestantism, royal propaganda to establish the legitimacy of Henri IV, and finally French propaganda. Less than 200 years before its construction, the English dominated the region. With Cordouan, France has reaffirmed its power."

An ambition: Unesco

Classified as a historic monument in 1862, the lighthouse aims to be added to the UNESCO heritage list. The verdict is expected by the end of 2020. "This could draw attention to the importance of this heritage and, more broadly, to the heritage of all lighthouses in France. We have an impressive architectural diversity of lighthouses, which needs to be preserved."

To the rhythm of the sea

"Here, we live with the elements. Our days are dictated by the small or large tides and by the sea, whether good or bad... We live and work with the ocean and the estuary."

Brittany: between wild coasts & lighthouses

"I love Brittany, there I find the wild, the primitive. When my shoes resonate on this granite floor, I hear the dull, muffled and powerful sound that I seek in painting". At the end of the 1880s, Paul Gauguin succumbed to the charms of this region, as emblematic as it is true. While it is not Polynesia, another province dear to the painter, it has equally exotic charms. Among the Ponant Islands, proof comes in the form of the diversity of wild flora on the island of Bréhat, the crystal clear waters of the Glénan archipelago, and the Pointe des Poulains, an uninhabited and cut-off peninsula at the northwest end of Belle-Île-en-mer.

Like sentinels at the outposts, watching for the heaving of the ocean, the lighthouses leave their stamp on this region. The Breton coast holds the world record for the greatest concentration of these lookouts, which untiringly guide sailors to safe harbour. The famous "lighthouse route" also give you the chance to admire their many particularities. They also mark the entrance to the abers, or rias (Celtic and Spanish/Galician words for estuaries). Born out of the meeting between the rising tide and the vegetation, they reveal inspirational landscapes. In France, this phenomenon exists only in Brittany!

FOCUS ON... BELLE-ÎLE-EN-MER

- At 85 km2, the well named Belle-Île-en-mer, is the largest of the Ponant Islands.
- Untamed landscapes shape the north of the island. The Pointe des Poulains with its chiselled cliffs, or the cove of Ster-Ouen which hides below the green hilly terrain leading to a sandy beach, are the most striking examples.
- In 1894, enchanted by the beauty of the Pointe des Poulains, the tragedian Sarah Bernhardt acquired the dilapidated military fort sitting there and transformed it into a holiday resort. Of Belle-Île-en-mer she came to write: "I like to come to this picturesque island every year, to taste the charm of its wild and grandiose beauty."
- In the northwest of the island, the port of Sauzon or "port fleuri" (flowery port) also charms visitors. It nestles in the extension of the Sauzon river estuary. Its name, coming from the Breton "Saozon" originates with the settling of the Saxon pirates in the 3rd century who made it a base from where they could plunder the mainland coasts.

With its crystal clear waters, its lagoon and its white sandbanks, this archipelago is the Tahiti of southern Brittany!"

Taking a new look at iconic areas is the essence of this itinerary to discover the natural wonders of the Normandy and Brittany coasts.

From Le Havre, navigating the Seine reveals as many heritage treasures as green landscapes. At the foot of the Étretat cliffs, we see the strength of the elements, which have for millennia sculpted the limestone and shaped a breathtaking landscape. Along the Pink Granite coast, the naturalists on board will reveal the secrets of the Sept-Îles archipelago, a protected site that shelters one of the two Breton colonies of grey seals and the Northern Gannets on Île Rouzic, the oldest private ornithological reserve in France. On the mainland, the picturesque old fishing village of Ploumanac'h offers multiple viewpoints of the coppery rocks, weathered by the assaults of the wind and the sea. We will then set sail for the Channel Islands after making a stopover in Chausey. In the open sea, some of the 360 islets of this archipelago belonging to the Ponant Islands, and the largest in Europe, hold their share of surprises as they emerge or slip away at the will of the tides. They flirt with the spray and offer a romantic, almost unreal vision arising from the sea.

FOCUS ON... PLOUMANAC'H

- Former fishing hamlet whose natural harbour is one of the most sheltered in Brittany, Ploumanac'h is bordered by transparent waters and rocks responsible for the renown of the Pink Granite Coast.
- This idyllic setting earned it the title of favourite French village in 2015.
- 300 million years old, the pink granite rocks measure up to more than 20 metres high and have nicknames that are evocative to say the least: Napoleon's hat, lovers' hut, mushroom, etc...
- An icon of the village, the Ploumanac'h or Maen Ruz lighthouse, literally "red stone" in Breton, was built in 1860 using this rock with coppery reflections. Destroyed during the Second World War, it was rebuilt in 1946 with the help of the Beaux-Arts. The goal: to maintain harmony with the surrounding natural setting, classified shortly before the war.





DID YOU KNOW?

Étretat, perfect impression

Poetry and living canvases. Perfect connection between the waters and the skies, the high limestone cliffs imbue the Alabaster coast with a feeling somewhere between immutability and agitation, peace and tumult.

At the end of the 19th century, Gustave Flaubert asked his disciple, Guy de Maupassant, to give him a detailed account of the coasts that line Étretat.

The latter, who spent part of his childhood in the region, gave a detailed account of each relief in the landscape. "*The little gate of Étretat looks, from afar, in the dark times which blacken it, like a huge elephant drinking from the sea*", he wrote to his mentor. Some of these observations appear in passages from *Une Vie* and *Bouvard and Pécuchet*.

The Impressionists try to grasp the different nuances. Gustave Courbet and Claude Monet painted the shores of Étretat more than 50 times each, in all weathers. "*The cliffs here are like nowhere else*" noted Claude Monet.

"It was his territory", analyses Philippe Piguet, teacher and art critic, specialist in the painter. Between September 1885 and early 1886, the artist produced 37 paintings there, as a final complete transcription of the Normandy coast *"before taking possession of the territory of Giverny"*. And for good reason: *"Étretat is to the first Monet what Giverny is to the second"*.

The heritage of the Mediterranean coast

At times the accent there sings as much as the seagulls in the azure sky, there we speak with our hands, we breathe in the iodised scent of the spray, we savour the sun caressing the skin. Departing from our home port of Marseille, this cruise is one of wonder to discover the natural and cultural heritage of the Mediterranean coast.

It all starts at the mouth of the Rhône, in the Camargue. Men pass on thousand-year-old know-how in rice fields and salt pans, in harmony with the Camargue regional natural park, a refuge for 400 species of birds, including the flamingo.

The landscapes follow on, one from another, from the turquoise water filled creeks to the bay of La Ciotat and the cove of Mugel. The peninsula of Saint-Tropez and its Cape Taillat, planted with maritime pines and cork oaks provide the gateway to the Côte d'Azur, followed by the Île d'Or which inspired Hergé's background for Tintin's adventures in the Black Island.

After the Estérel coast and its red rock massifs, new panoramas give a sample of this much sought-after *dolce vita*, with the colourful villages of Cinque Terre and Portofino, in Italy, and finally, the wild beauty of the Îles d'Hyères off the Var coast.

$\[\neg \]$ FOCUS ON... THE CALANQUES, $\[\bot \]$ FROM MARSEILLE TO LA CIOTAT

- A succession of sheltered coves, the Calanques range stretches from Marseille to La Ciotat, via Cassis.
- The Calanques National Park was created in 2012. It comprises 8,500 hectares of land and 43,500 hectares of sea. It is the first peri-urban national park in Europe.
- It is home to 140 protected terrestrial animal and plant species, 60 marine heritage species and 5 habitats of community interest, considered rare and fragile in Europe.
- Among the characteristic marine species are the brown grouper, the diadem sea urchin, the red coral, the yellow gorgonian and, further offshore, the bottlenose dolphin, the loggerhead turtle and the fin whale.
- The massif is also the refuge of many sea birds. It is home to 30% of the population of grey puffins and storm petrels in France.

It is a region apart. You cannot tame it; it tames the visitor. A region that reveals its power and originality when you get off the beaten track and reach less well known areas. This cruise from Nice presents you with the untamed side of the Île de Beauté.

Its natural sites abound with wonders. The same goes for the tranquil coasts of Macinaggio, north of Cape Corsica, the paradisiacal beaches of the Gulf of Santa Manza, and the impressive cliffs of the Mouths of Bonifacio. Transparent waters and ideal temperatures complete these picture postcard backdrops and tempt you to swim and partake in nautical activities.

In the South, the tormented contours reflect the raw soul of the island. This is evidenced by the Cape of Pertusato - its pierced rock and the caves carved out by the sea after which it is named, meaning "perforated" - or the Cape of Roccapina. Carved ridges and preserved pine forests hide two turquoise bays bordered by white sand and from which the Lion of Roccapina watches, a rocky point climbing to 144 metres. The tip of Parata and the Sanguinaires islands mark the high point of this journey where land and sea merge in a magnificent natural panorama.

☐ ☐ FOCUS ON... THE MOUTHS _____ OF BONIFACIO

- In the south of Corsica, overlooking the sea, Bonifacio or "the city of cliffs", is the southernmost city in mainland France.
- Not far away are the Mouths of Bonifacio, an international strait separating the south of the island and Sardinia.
- The Mouths of Bonifacio nature reserve covers 80,000 hectares of sea and land. It is the largest public domain reserve in mainland France. The site contains 37% of the remarkable Mediterranean species.
- This reserve encompasses incomparable landscapes: cliffs, coves, sandy beaches, sea caves, lagoons and large herbaria which are the refuge of a cosmopolitan flora with endemic species and varied fauna. Depending on the season, there are sea turtles, bottlenose dolphins, grey puffins and groupers.





DID YOU KNOW?

Genoese towers

They sit facing the sea along the Corsican coasts. Sometimes whole, always straight and proud like that of La Parata near Ajaccio, sometimes rickety. Often their remains merge with the rocks on which they were built between the 15th and 17th centuries. Of the 120 Genoese towers that existed on the Corsican coast in 1730, today there remains 67, some of which are classified as historic monuments.

At the crossroads of the maritime routes between France, Italy and Sardinia, Corsica of the Republic of Genoa protected itself against the plundering and repeated kidnapping of inhabitants by the Barbary pirates. It employed a simple system. Two to six men recruited from the villagers stood guard ON each tower. At the slightest warning, they sent smoke signals to the other lookouts or sounded the alarm with the bass tone of conch shells. Each tower thus warns the adjacent two, the whole island soon being informed of the danger.

However, the lack of experience and equipment of these soldiers of fortune often led to the desertion of these outposts, their degradation and their abandonment.

While there were many Genoese towers in Corsica, they also sat watch over the coasts of several ancient territories of the Republic of Genoa, as on the islands of Elba and Capraia, Tabarka in Tunisia, and on the Ukrainian shores of the Black Sea, Turkish or Russian.
